

Revised version as of 9 February 2012

This document is a compendium of all the proposals on themes and workshops we received so far for the next EuroDIG meeting in Stockholm on 14/15 June 2012

We received 71 inputs and proposals for the 2012 EuroDIG agenda. This is an amazing proof of the continuing bottom-up EuroDIG dynamic!

This result offered a challenge for our first preparatory meeting in Stockholm on 19 January, where we concentrated on a review of the proposals we received during the call period from October 2011 to January 2012.

As it is almost impossible to accommodate so many ideas and proposals in a two-day program, we had to agree on a suitable procedure. Therefore we discussed and agreed on an outline of around seven thematic tracks (according to topics and colours in the listing) and to group as many proposals as possible in a first program outline what will be published on our website soon. A conceivable option to consider more proposals is by offering more pre-/side events, poster or flash sessions than the years before.

The preliminary draft of a 2012 program structure will be based on key topics and without any timing at a first stage. It will be submitted for review regarding consistence, missing issues or aspects to be considered etc. And we will ask for comments until middle of February again.

A next preparatory meeting with representatives of the core group for verifying comments and to work on a consolidated draft program is foreseen in line with the next IGF Open Consultations on 15 February (late afternoon) in Geneva. Details on this meeting will be communicated right in advance.

According to the Milestones to Stockholm, a substantiated draft program (incl. timing and program slots) needs to be finalised by the end of February. At that stage, we will know how many proposals and topics can be considered and the various program slots have to be organized from beginning of March onwards.

Thanks a lot for all your cooperation so far and we are looking forward to some more feedbacks.

Freedom of expression in the digital age - ie the right to receive and impart information without undue interference from Gov. The role of internet service providers in protecting the rights of their customers.

The role of the internet in helping citizens to help themselves - particularly the right to education, housing, social security, health and participate in cultural life.

Website blocking: do what I say, not what I do: explore the increasing gulf between rhetoric and practice in Europe and the US. Website blocking is increasingly advanced as silver bullet for domestic issue in European countries and the US, however at an international level the very same countries are criticising countries of the global south for website blocking

Are you a consumer or participant? – explore the role of the internet in turning passive consumers into active participants. The difference between the internet, and let's say radio and broadcast, is that citizens can not only download but upload. This makes the internet incredibly empowering, but there are increasing moves by Government to turn the internet into cable TV – you can only consume what gatekeepers deem fit and proper, and participation is not welcome.

Does the internet make the postal service redundant: over the past century the postal service has been considered as one of the essential services every citizens need to have access to in order to participate fully in the economy and society. Many countries have therefore implemented universal service obligations for postal services. However, as email increasingly replaces post as everyday communication technology, and much of the communication with public and private sectors is now online, the question is how to reconcile universal service obligations for post, with universal service obligations for the internet. If a region is fully internet connected, does it need a universal service in post? And can there be an internet based economy without a postal services (think e-commerce)?

Concise description:	<p>Problems related to online illegal content (e.g. child pornography) and other infringements of legal provisions in the online space (copyright infringements, online gambling, online selling of prohibited substances, etc) have been approached in some European legal frameworks through provisions related to imposing Internet filtering or blocking. Discussions on these issues existed at EU level also, in the context of the debates on a proposed directive addressed at combating online child abuses. Debates over Internet blocking are also taking place within ICANN, with regard to the new gTLD Program and the fact that some governments may choose to block new gTLDs at national level, in case these gTLDs are opposed to national laws or present other problems at national level.</p> <p>But how efficient are these measures with respect to achieving the desired goal? What are the downsides of such measures when it comes to the security and stability of the Internet, on one side, and to the fundamental human rights (freedom of expression, privacy, data protection, right to information), on the other side? What is the impact of such measures on ISPs? Are there better alternatives to Internet blocking and filtering?</p> <p>The proposed workshop will put face to face proponents and opponents of Internet blocking and filtering and will try to find answers to the above questions. It will also discuss the implications of the decision of the Court of Justice of the European Union regarding the fact that ISPs cannot be requested to install systems for filtering their entire communications in order to stop and prevent illegal transfer of files.</p>

In order to make the 30.11. deadline, herewith a couple of preliminary ideas for 2012 themes of the EuroDIG that were discussed at a recent meeting of the Finnish stakeholders:

1) **The harvest of the 2011 vintage of Internet principles.** - As Wolfgang has pointed out, this was the year of "Governments for Internet Principles" - by G8, CoE, OSCE, OECD -- practically by everybody and his uncle. What caused this sudden burst of governmental activity, after years when Western governments didn't want to touch the subject from a principal point at all? In his article in Kieren's blog, Wolfgang made a good preliminary analysis of those "laundry lists". It could be continued and deepened, not the least as a reply to those who want to throw everything on the lap of the United Nations. I hope W. would be interested to take the lead of this theme, and I would very much like to be on the team as well.

2) **Netizenship vs citizenship.** - Among the 2 billion Internet users, there are hundreds of millions of people for whom their "netizenship" in various social networks rivals their citizenship in whatever state they are citizens of. We propose that EuroDIG would reflect on this situation, and we come back to a more detailed suggestion on how.

Dear mr. Ludwig,

This email is a request to consider the Dutch National Rapporteur as a speaker during any forthcoming EuroDIG meeting. The speech would e.g. stress the importance of her function and highlight some of her findings and recommendations on how internet governance and preventing and fighting online child sexual abuse in the 21st century are interrelated. Already, the Dutch government, ECP-EPN (IGF-NL) and Bits of Freedom (member of EDRI) were very positive about this particular topic.

Background

The National Rapporteur on Trafficking in Human Beings – Mrs. Corinne Dettmeijer-Vermeulen – was appointed by the Minister of Justice as the first rapporteur on child pornography in October 2009. On October 12 2011, the National Rapporteur presented her First Report on Child Pornography to the Minister of Security and Justice and the State Secretary of Public Health, Welfare and Sport. Immediately afterwards, the Minister stated he would adopt the main recommendation of the Rapporteur: to form an integrated approach to protect children against all forms of sexual violence of which (independent) monitoring is an essential element.

Independent monitoring mechanisms are vital for a democratic society as they critically review all governmental responses to child sexual abuse. The fact that the Rapporteur has an independent position is crucial in this respect; it forms the basis for an objective and non biased view on the developments and the pro's and the con's of the Dutch counter-trafficking and sexual abuse policies and practices. Her reports (and the fact that they are issued regularly), therefore function as an impetus both to the government and to Parliament to perform their respective tasks of fighting sexual abuse of children and monitoring the effectiveness of that fight.

Concise description:	<p>Today's Internet traffic is distributed across nation state borders ad hoc, i.e. without predictability in specific exchange-points for internet, and thus without predictability in route. A simple message can go via one country one day, and via a very different route the other day.</p> <p>This horizontal and ad hoc distribution of electronic communication is a challenge to nation states' ambitions to govern content of the Internet, and is especially in clash with national legislation. Even if Internet traffic is intended for local or national use (i.e. both sender and receiver of Internet traffic is within a country), traffic may become routed out of the country, and thus under interest from a foreign states 'wire tapping' or other national laws.</p> <p>During fall 2011 we've seen national initiatives for such national governance from distance, e.g. US senate initiative Stop Online Piracy Act (SOPA). We've seen how a court order from US soil has been used to take down web pages in Spain, etc.</p> <p>During 2011, we've also seen an explicit strategy by digital content owners to use Internet intermediaries (Internet Service Providers, ISP) to hunt down digital piracy. This idea to control digital content by Internet providers</p> <p>Initiatives founded in the US origins from the possibility to filter or block IP-addresses or domain-names to websites with unwanted digital content. However, such initiatives have profound collateral damage.</p> <p>The most general and also principal collateral damage of such rule of law is the disproportionality between individual integrity on the one hand, and the urge to control digital content on the other hand. It can be argued that by making Internet Service providers listen in to e-mails and other forms of digital content, is the basic foundation for totalitarian societies, and absence of Human Rights such as freedom of expression and freedom of information.</p> <p>A second principally based issue is the challenge of rule under national law, distributed by the horizontally distributed Internet traffic. What country's law is to govern randomly dispersed Internet Traffic? The seizure of former site Roijdirect.com by US agencies is one illustration of such a challenge.</p> <p>This seminar aims to discuss such legal systems, and their natural boundaries, and how they interact with the technical infrastructure. How can such collateral damage from the conflict between national legislation and technical traffic allocation be avoided? How can this conflict of interests be handled within the notion of a single European market?</p>

Concise description:	<p>More than 70 percent of the world's potential internet users lack connection to the Internet. The mass of new Internet users in the nearest future, will cause a need for hundreds of millions IP addresses. As IPv4 very soon is no longer available and at the same time IPv6 is obtainable in abundance, each individual can get a unique public IPv6 address. However it's not feasible to have an IPv6-only connection today unless the IPv4-accessible content of today also become available via IPv6.</p> <p>Users in the developed countries have since long got plenty of IP addresses and Internet connection via IPv4. The scarcity of IPv4 addresses hasn't had any noticeable impact so far in these regions, leading to weak incentives to deploy IPv6. Because of this it is important that we all try to convince providers of content and services in the developed regions, that it's important for them to show solidarity with the developing world and learn also "to speak IPv6" in parallel to existing IPv4 connection via so called dual stack technology. Otherwise, to obtain content that is available only via IPv4, operators will have to provide new IPv6-connected users with carrier grade NATs for translation between IPv6 and IPv4. That scenario will lead to limited functionality for certain applications, communication latency, inferior end-to-end security and creation of single points of failure.</p> <p>Indeed these same providers of content, services or e-commerce for example companies dealing with e-commerce, insurance or banking, would benefit from asking themselves if they want to be able to communicate with the whole of internet and ensuing potential new customers. No doubt the answer is going to be positive. Eventually, when all content in the future is accessible also via IPv6, IPv4 technology can be phased out which would be beneficial to all stakeholders.</p>

Digital Citizenship

Title of the workshop:

Digital Citizenship - How do we prepare the next million internet users for a safe and productive internet experience?

Concise description:

The United Nation's International Telecommunications Union (ITU) reported that the number of internet users hit 2.08 billion at the end of 2010. While that number may seem impressive, it still only represents less than 1/3 of the world's population.

But even that is going to change.

As deployment of traditional fixed broadband continues in new areas, more and more people will have access at their home and or place of work. Nearly one billion people subscribe to a mobile broadband package via their smartphones and the advent of ICANN's new gTLD program and the internationalized domain names, where those who communicate in non-Latin scripts will be able to use those scripts to navigate the web, will lead to a new generation of users. Even before we hit the 2 billion user mark, many were already talking about the next billion users.

As the next billion users come on line, what must we do to prepare them for a safe and productive internet experience?

Digital Citizenship efforts offer a roadmap to help internet users to learn how to use technology in a safer and more appropriate manner. As billions of people interact using various technologies, this had led to a digital society complete with ecommerce, education, employment, and entertainment opportunities. Social networking has led to a new and completely different way of interacting with friends, family and even complete strangers. User generated content is feeding websites with news, reviews and perspectives that were often limited in the offline world.

But when people use technology in ways that run counter to what is generally accepted behavior, how should others react? How do you prepare users, especially the next billion internet users, for a world where 98% of email is spam, phishing and pharming efforts are becoming more sophisticated, and cyberbullying is growing far too quickly? How do you warn consumers about the growing security threats on mobile devices as we see an increase in attacks focused on consumers using their smartphones for mobile payments and online banking? How do you give these people the knowledge and the tools to know what is safe and what is not in a cyberworld that changes every single day?

Our workshop will be divided into two panels:

The first panel will focus on the challenges to implementing a digital citizenship effort. Speakers will outline what they see as some of the challenges to Digital Citizenship efforts, including finding ways to educate youth outside of a traditional education curriculum, challenges of educating seniors, and finding resources to run such programs where all of the emphasis seems to be focused on deployment of and access to broadband infrastructure.

The second panel will share success stories from existing digital citizenship effort and explore how these experiences can be used by organizations. The panel will be comprised of people who are on the front lines of educating users about how to use new technologies safely and effectively. We will encourage workshop attendees to think of their own particular communities and ask specific questions as to how they can take the lessons learned and apply them. This portion of the workshop is geared towards turning discussion to actions.

We anticipate 2-4 speakers for each panel, a moderator for each panel as well as a moderator

for remote participants. We intend to limit each speaker to no more than 8 minutes with the balance of the time for each panel reserved for Q&A. Key contact information for each panelist will be made available for individual one on one follow up and workshop organizers will provide resource materials that can be hosted on the EuroDIG website and can be used as a clearinghouse of material on this subject.

Key properties of a secured Internet routing infrastructure – achieving the right self-supporting incentives.

The session concerns the topic of securing the Internet routing infrastructure (BGP). This activity is carried out today in Europe on one hand by the RIPE NCC through the development of software infrastructure for standards produced by the "SIDR" (Secure Interdomain Routing) IETF WG, primarily in the form of resource certification - RPKI - and on the other hand by ISPs implementing it in their networks.

Our position is that the routing security implemented on the Internet, cannot be allowed to fail, else we have done ourselves a great disservice. It is of utmost importance to well understand the various ways routing security can fail.

The practical activities in Europe to secure the Internet routing have already started. We believe the consequences of this are not well understood by all stakeholders.

We'd like to put focus on what ought to be key properties for a robust and reliable core Internet infrastructure, and how this relates to various stakeholders. We'd then compare these with the current activities.

Key properties of secure Internet routing from an openness, robustness and reliability perspective.

=> "Concise description"

ISP:s today have, primarily due to the expected increased implicit threat of IP address hijacking due to the IPv4 address runout, an increasing incentive to deploy "BGP Security". It should be noted that extremely few malicious hijackings have been observed, although the the topic also encompasses security against simple mistakes with big consequences.

We want to invite the EuroDIG forum to become better aware of core Internet architecture principles, which we believe have been essential in the success of the Internet, and are essential in the continued success of the Internet. We would then like to show how these are affected by various models of securing the Internet routing infrastructure.

We want to show how some properties in the current Internet resource addressing system as implemented by the RIRs today have far reaching consequences on the robustness and resilience of an Internet with routing security.

We want to show how varying these and other key properties affect the solution space for the security model of the Internet routing infrastructure.

We will for example tap into state of the art SSL trust research (the Certificate Authority debacle) to show that trust issues are just as pervasive in internet routing security as they are on websites, only the consequences of trust failure on the secured Internet routing infrastructure are extremely more serious, potentially devastating if the security model is based solely on the 20-year old design of the current web security.

A single-root trust tree-hierarchy such as the DNS is vulnerable simply because every node in the tree has power over its children. This property makes the system's management easy to scale up, and has also because of that contributed to the success of the DNS. One downside of such a managed hierarchical system from an openness perspective is however that it is very attractive for exploitation, so as to remove DNS entries from the Internet (USG .com incidents, at the time of writing active USG legislative works).

Should the current security model of the Internet routing infrastructure be widely deployed, it is expected by many that several of these vulnerabilities of the DNS system from the openness perspective can be transferred to and applied on the Internet routing infrastructure. This is a very unwanted potential/expected consequence for many stakeholders.

1) Cyber Security: Attack on Human Factor

The attack types and forms increase as the internet increases its important role in daily political, social and economic life.

Now in many cases cyber attacks have political motivation often including attacks on financial, military, energy and other important sectors

(Typical examples are Estonia 2007, Georgia 2008, Iran 2010).

The aim of this workshop is to discuss contemporary issues of Cyber Security and their relation with political motivations.

dear eurodig coordinators -

i am writing to ask if you would be interested in a workshop being organised at the upcoming eurodig event in stockholm on 14 june, to present the results of an important project currently under way, initiated by the global network initiative (GNI), supported by microsoft, google, yahoo and a range of digital rights NGOs (website <http://globalnetworkinitiative.org/>), and led by myself and dr ian brown of the oxford internet institute (OII) of the university of oxford. the project is on "understanding the dynamics among freedom of expression, privacy, national security and law enforcement." drawing on recent events in the middle east and north africa:

"Dr Brown and Prof. Korff will develop guidance for Internet companies and governments, drawing heavily on the international human rights framework that they have both extensively analysed. They will gather best practice from across a diverse group of representatives from industry, government, civil society and law enforcement using interviews and three workshops in North America, Europe and Asia. This will build on their recent related work for the Council of Europe Commissioner for Human Rights on "Social Media and Human Rights"; on GNI's recent report on "Protecting Human Rights in the Digital Age"; and on other relevant academic, government and NGO literature, treaties, regulatory decisions and case law. This will include an analysis of the ongoing work on Internet freedom by the US, Swedish and Dutch governments. It will specifically analyse the range of approaches taken by companies in different jurisdictions and the challenges they face; implications for licensing and export of "dual use" technologies that can support surveillance and monitoring in repressive regimes; policy options for protecting human rights within national security policy; and specific guidance for companies in jurisdictions that face temporary suspensions of fundamental rights in emergencies."

i attach the fuller project outline, as well as the agenda and background paper to a recent workshop on these themes, held in london in december; a further similar event will take place in washington dc later this month; and a third in delhi in march. we will write up our findings and recommendations in april and may.

the results will be launched in washington dc on 14 june, but we felt it might be a very good idea to also present them, on the same day, at eurodig in stockholm, ie to have a simultaneous launch in the usa and in europe, to emphasise the importance of the issues to societies on both sides of the atlantic.

please let me know if you, as eurodig coordinators, are in principle interested in this idea. if so, i will gladly discuss the details further. GNI would take charge of the practical arrangements; i would lead the event.

Title of the workshop:

Access to information: A two-class infrastructure, better internet for those who can pay?

Concise description: Access to information is crucial for participation, employment and social development. Most of the large telecommunications providers of the world have been arguing for some time that it's necessary to let the mechanisms of free market economies play freely with the internet, allowing them to provide a speedy infrastructure at a steep surplus charge for everyone who can afford it. Most of the major content companies are strongly opposed to that approach, insisting that internet users should remain in full control of what content they view and that any kind of restriction on access and availability of content by internet service providers or governments ought to be prohibited. At the basis of the internet governance debate there is an ethical question: should there be control over the internet?

1. Background information

After 5 years, the Data Retention Directive is currently again on the top of the agenda in Europe. This topic generated important discussions from a legal and technical point of view, as the Directive has been limited, in terms of (purpose and retention periods, and also in the area of reimbursement of costs incurred by operators. (which is outside its scope).

This discussion is extremely important since data retention is an important instrument for law enforcement investigations, but at the same data could be used by some Internet Service Providers to violate the data protection right of the user (see opinion 13/11 WP29 Group).

For this reason the Romanian, German and Czech Constitutional Court have annulled the domestic legislation transposing the Directive, and they are considering how to recreating the Directive. Other Member States, decided not to implement the Data Retention Directive.

The goal of the workshop is to assess and analyze the various steps taken during these years towards a review of the EU Data Retention Directive. We would like to examine four relevant aspects such as law enforcement agencies' needs, data protection, cybersecurity and industry position.

2. Concept of the workshop

Due to the positive experience with interactive formats at previous EURODIG's, the workshop will give maximum time to comments and questions from the audience. The idea is that the moderator picks up issues that are raised and puts it to the room. The role of the speakers is only to present some initial points that will set the pace for the debate. The role of the speakers is only to ease the audience into the discussion by raising some contentious issues.
