## Developing a Pan-European perspective for Internet governance

---

### What is EuroDIG?

The European Dialogue on Internet governance (EuroDIG) is an open network for discussion and exchange on public policy issues related to Internet governance between stakeholders from all over Europe.

EuroDIG was launched in 2008 by several key European organisations representing several stakeholder groups and particularly active in the Internet governance field. So far, four EuroDIG meetings have been held: Strasbourg (2008), Geneva (2009), Madrid (2010) and Belgrade (2011) The next one will be in June 2012 in Stockholm.

### Which are its objectives?

The key objective of EuroDIG is to shape a European perspective and responses to the challenges of Internet governance. It also aims to help European stakeholders to exchange their views, and to prepare the European contributions to the Internet Governance Forum organised by the United Nations.

Another aim is to highlight the diversity of experience of the different European stakeholders and raise awareness in Europe and among European stakeholders about the relevance of Internet governance issues discussed.

### What issues does it deal with?

The issues addressed deal with all the topics that require a public policy response: the management and protection of critical Internet resources and infrastructure, cybercrime, child protection, digital literacy, freedom of

expression, protection of privacy, content regulation and diversity, social networks and cloud computing, the roles and responsibilities of regulators and businesses, as well as the rights of users.

### Who organises EuroDIG?

EuroDIG is a network open to all interested representatives from governments, businesses, civil society, the academic and technical community, international and intergovernmental organisations from all over Europe.

The main strategic organ for developing the EuroDIG process and the planning EuroDIG conferences is the programme network. This is a bottom-up structure open to all interested European stakeholders. The programme network is surrounded by a larger network of EuroDIG supporters.

A small secretariat has been established in order to coordinate the EuroDIG process. The EuroDIG secretariat is supported by the Council of Europe, the Swiss Federal Office of Communication (OFCOM), the European Broadcasting Union as well as other European and national entities from all stakeholders. For the organisation of the annual event, the host organisation takes the main responsibility. For the 2012 EuroDIG conference, this is the Swedish Post and Telecom Authority (PTS).

### What results has it produced?

EuroDIG is a multistakeholder discussion platform to share information and good practices. It is not a decision-making body, but it is influencing public policy across the continent and it is facilitating valuable exchanges on how the Internet should be shaped and governed.

After every meeting a document of messages is prepared – “Messages from Belgrade” were prepared last year and widely circulated. The Messages are presented to the Internet Governance Forum organised by the United Nations every year with a view to contributing to global, other regional and national debates on Internet governance.

#### **Where will the next meeting take place?**

The fifth EuroDIG conference will take place in Stockholm on 14-15 June 2012. It will bring together more than 500 representatives from governments, international and regional organisations, regulatory agencies, businesses, and civil society as well as other communities across Europe. Again it is expected that leading companies such as Ericsson, Microsoft, Google Cisco, Telefónica and Telenor, will be represented as well as business associations like the German Association of Internet Economy (eco), the European Association of Internet Providers (EuroISPA) and the International Chamber of Commerce (ICC).

Participants will also be able to take part in the equal-footed discussions, from remote hubs set up throughout Europe and through a webcast.

The fifth EuroDIG conference will be organised by the Swedish government under the auspices of the Swedish Post and Telecom Authority (PTS), in cooperation with the Council of Europe, the Swiss Federal Office of Communication (OFCOM), the European Broadcasting Union (EBU) and other local and European partners.

#### **How will EuroDIG contribute to national debates on Internet governance?**

EuroDIG plans to support and assist in the setting up of national Internet governance platforms across Europe and to connect them together as part of a common space to further discuss and interact.

EuroDIG is also offering a content frame for national IGF processes to be fed into the European discussion on Internet governance.
